ARIZONA SCHOOL CHOICE TRUST

As some of you know, I became a board member of the Arizona School Choice Trust (ASCT) in early 2009. ASCT was founded in 1993 with a mission to provide hope and opportunity for low income families by awarding scholarships to enable their children to attend private elementary and secondary schools (K-12) throughout the state of Arizona.

This year we awarded more than 1,200 scholarships to children who qualify for the free and reduced school lunch program to attend private schools throughout the state. Aside from helping kids from low income families receive a high quality education; for contributors who pay Arizona state income taxes, all donations are 100% cost free up to \$500 for individual filers and \$1,000 for joint filers through Arizona's dollar-for-dollar tax credit. You don't even have to itemize your tax return, and there are no complicated forms to fill out.

Not only are the children from low income Arizona families, who primarily come from failing schools, given the opportunity to receive a superior private education; the state saves an average of \$9,707 per child by no longer having them in public schools for giving up an average of \$4,000 in income tax credits.

It is important to note that ASCT is not affiliated with any religious organization. It is open to all children of limited financial means to attend any private school their families choose, whether secular or religious.

There is currently a long waiting list of students who we were not able to grant scholarships. Your gift will help children from low income families obtain quality private educations.

I will place brochures and contribution forms on the glass bookshelf across from the kitchen at the church. I would also be happy to talk to anyone about ASCT.



Editors Note



This year's Veterans Day Service honors not only our veterans, but the family and friends of those who serve.

In honor of our veterans I wanted to share the following information. Many of our Veterans do not realize they now have the privilege of saluting even when they are not in uniform.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Jim Inhofe (R-OK) today praised the passage by unanimous consent of his bill (S.1877) clarifying U.S. law to allow veterans and servicemen not in uniform to salute the flag. Current law (US Code Title 4, Chapter 1) states that veterans and servicemen not in uniform should place their hand over their heart without clarifying whether they can or should salute the flag. "The salute is a form of honor and respect, representing pride in one's military service," Senator Inhofe said.

"Veterans and service members continue representing the military services even when not in uniform."Unfortunately, current U.S. law leaves confusion as to whether veterans and service members out of uniform can or should salute the flag. My legislation will clarify this regulation, allowing veterans and servicemen alike to salute the flag, whether they are in uniform or not.

"I look forward to seeing those who have served saluting proudly at baseball games, parades, and formal events. I believe this is an appropriate way to honor and recognize the 25 million veterans in the United States who have served in the military and remain as role models to others citizens. Those who are currently serving or have served in the military have earned this right, and their recognition will be an inspiration to others."

This Bill was passed 25 July 2007.

The story is told of an old man who lived on a farm in the mountains of eastern Kentucky with his young grandson. Each morning, Grandpa was up early sitting at the kitchen table reading from his old worn-out Bible. His grandson who wanted to be just like him tried to imitate him in any way he could.

One day the grandson asked, "Papa, I try to read the Bible just like you but I don't understand it, and what I do understand I forget as soon as I close the book. What good does reading the Bible do?" The Grandfather quietly turned from putting coal in the stove and said, "Take this old wicker coal basket down to the river and bring back a basket of water."

The boy did as he was told, even though all the water leaked out before he could get back to the house. The grandfather laughed and said, "You will have to move a little faster next time," and sent him back to the river with the basket to try again. This time the boy ran faster, but again the old wicker basket was empty before he returned home. Out of breath, he told his grandfather that it was "impossible to carry water in a basket," and he went to get a bucket instead. The old man said, "I don't want a bucket of water; I want a basket of water. You can do this. You're just not trying hard enough," and he went out the door to watch the boy try again.

At this point, the boy knew it was impossible, but he wanted to show his grandfather that even if he ran as fast as he could, the water would leak out before he got far at all. The boy scooped the water and ran hard, but when he reached his grandfather the basket was again empty. Out of breath, he said, "See Papa, it's useless!"

"So you think it is useless?" The old man said, "Look at the basket." The boy looked at the basket and for the first time he realized that the basket looked different. Instead of a dirty old wicker coal basket, it was clean. "Son, that's what happens when you read the Bible. You might not understand or remember everything, but when you read it, it will change you from the inside out."

That is the work of God in our lives - to change us from the inside out and to slowly transform us into the image of His son. Moral of the wicker basket story: Take time to read a portion of God's word each day; it will affect you for good even if you don't retain a word.

Greetings!

This week, we continue to look at the <u>Enduring Principles</u>, specifically the Worth of All Persons. This can be a challenging concept. There is so much prejudice and hatred in our world. We must examine our own lives and become more aware of our own shortcomings.

The area I live in has a contractor do the landscaping and maintenance. The people work hard physically. I try to acknowledge them when I see them working. Of the dozen or so workers I've come across, all but one has been a different race than me. I wonder sometimes if others don't see them. I try to say hi or at least smile at them — to make sure they know I see them. I also try to greet each young person or child. Sometimes I think they look like they don't want to be spoken to, but in most cases I at least smile and nod. It depends on their age.

While these efforts are important and might seem small, there are bigger ways to make a difference in recognizing the worth of all persons. At Mission Center conference and World Conference we will consider legislation to allow ministers in the Community of Christ to conduct marriage ceremonies for our brothers and sisters who are gay and lesbian in states and nations where it is legal. One resolution will have us consider the ordination of our brothers and sisters who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered. While these discussions might be difficult for some, it is important that we have them and consider what it means when we say that one of our enduring principles is the Worth of All Persons." First and foremost, people who are different from us *are people*. They are someone's brother, sister, aunt, uncle, mother, father, cousin or friend. We must work toward not putting people in boxes, not placing labels on them. The peace of Jesus Christ calls us to work on behalf of all those who are marginalized. We must work at seeing them as God sees them.

Sweet Potato Casserole

Potato Mixture:

3 5	lbs	large eggs fresh sweet potatoes or yams, boiled, drained, peeled, mashed (6 cups)
2/3 2/3 1/3 1 1/2	cup cup cup tsp. tsp.	granulated sugar melted butter or margarine heavy cream Vanilla Ground nutmeg and allspice

Topping:

1	cup	packed light brown sugar
1/3	cup	flour
1	cup	finely chopped pecans or walnuts
1/3	cup	margarine cut in small pieces

Heat oven to 350°. Grease shallow 2 quart baking dish.

Potato Mixture:

Beat eggs in large bowl, stir in potatoes until blended. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Spread evenly in baking dish.

Topping:

Mix sugar, flour and nuts. Work in butter until well blended. Sprinkle over potato mixture. Bake 1 hour until topping is brown and bubbling.
